## MEL VISITS SCJOHNSON HQ - By Mitch Weiss



Special screening of the film "Frank Llyod Wright in Racine

On June 13, 37 MEL members and 10 vehicles headed north to visit SC Johnson's Global Campus in Racine, Wisconsin.

The primary purpose was to tour the 1939, Frank Lloyd Wright (FLW) designed Administrative Building, considered one of the 25 most outstanding buildings of the twentieth century.

After a special screening of the film "Frank Lloyd Wright in Racine" at the Golden Rondelle Theater, an SC Johnson building moved from the 1964-65 New York World's Fair to Racine, we broke into two groups. Each group had an opportunity to tour the FLW designed Administrative Building, the FLW designed Research Tower, the repurposed, Gensler designed, Waxbird Commons, and, the Foster + Partners designed, Fortaleza Hall.

Gensler is the same firm that handled the \$800 million repurposing of the Old Post Office in Chicago. Foster+ Partners designed the new Apple Store on the banks of the Chicago River at Michigan Avenue.

The Administrative Building or Great Workroom is highlighted by soaring 30-foot columns called dendriform, often referred to as lily pads. These concrete elements are 9-inches at their base and 18.5 feet in diameter at the roof line. Instead of windows, Wright used 43 miles of glass Pyrex tubing to allow outside light in. Wright designed 40 different pieces of furniture reflecting the building's unique character. Nearly 200 special brick shapes were created to achieve the building curves Wright envisioned.

The 15 floor Research Center, which opened in 1950, is a 40-foot square, 150 feet high. It is one of the tallest structures built on the cantilever principle. The walls are banded with 5,800 glass Pyrex tubes and 21,000 bricks. Unfortunately, without the addition of an external fire escape, it was unable to meet current building codes. No longer large enough to accommodate Johnson's continually growing R&D requirements, it was taken out of service in 1982.

Waxbird Commons is the newest edition to the campus. It is a repurposed group of former manufacturing facilities converted into conference and meeting spaces. It features a contemporary and collaborative design with elements that focus on key historical moments, company artifacts, and materials that reflect the purpose and culture of the company. Within the building's lobby is Johnson's first airplane, the Waxbird. The building is on track to earn a Leadership in Energy and Environment Design (LEED) Gold Certification.

Fortaleza Hall was our final stop. This 60,000 square-foot facility, designed by Foster + Partners, was completed in 2010. Fortaleza Hall is a celebration of the life-changing 1935 journey to Brazil by H.F. Johnson, third generation company leader, as traced by his son Sam six decades later. Brazil, a major source of the palms that produce carnauba wax, has major historical significance to the Johnson family.

Fortaleza Hall incorporates glass and light, rounded shapes and edges, soaring stone columns and innovative design. Hung from the ceiling is a replica of the Sikorsky S-38 amphibious plane Sam Johnson flew from Racine to Fortaleza, Brazil in 1998.

Finally, this was a MEL event, so on our way home we ate a late lunch at the regionally renowned Brat Stop in Kenosha, WI.

### MEL VOLUNTEERS FOR THE GREATER CHICAGO FOOD DEPOSITORY (GCFD)

On May 23, 18 MELMEN, fighting traffic delays to the Edens and on the Kennedy, traveled to McCormick Place to again engage in the oldest of all MEL events—gathering donated food from the many vendors who had booths at the annual National Restaurant Association's giant show.

Veterans as well as first-timers donned the green t-shirts identifying us as volunteers for the Greater Chicago Food Depository (GCFD) and ventured into the chaos of a show being torn down at McCormick Place. GCFD is the major distributor of food products to over 600 food pantries, which serve the needy throughout Cook County.

Pulling carts, loaded with large empty boxes that once contained fresh bananas, we went up and down the aisles of the show looking for premarked donations and occasionally cajoling vendors to donate food—fresh, canned, bottled, refrigerated and frozen. The amount collected by all volunteers was 40,476 pounds, enough for 33,730 meals!

So we hiked and we schlepped and occasionally kvetched for about three hours (from about 3:00 PM to 6:00-ish). And in this fashion we spent enough calories to earn the right to eat at Manny's Deli. Thanks to Bill Gurolnick for once again leading us in this mitzvah.
