MEL PLAYS PICKLEBALL – By Aaron Hershinow



Pickleball, invented in 1965, is a racket or paddle sport combining elements of tennis, badminton, and table tennis. Players hit a perforated, hollow plastic ball with paddles over a 34-inch-high net until one side is unable to return the ball or commits a rule infraction. It is widely acknowledged as the fastest growing sport in history.

Melmen began playing pickleball about nine years ago. Al Newman started this activity at MEL and was quickly joined by Jack Meyers. Unfortunately, Al has aged out, but Jack is still an avid player—in fact he's a pickleball cultist. Carl Rosenthal taught them how to play (and still spends a lot of time teaching players). In the early days they had to personally lay down tape at the JCC to define the court. Jack was struggling with this task until Ulfur Thors showed him how to do it correctly.

These days Aaron Hershinow is the activity facilitator, and we usually have 6-12 players each week. The level of play is such ("Nobody is great.") that a newcomer will not be overwhelmed, so if you've been thinking of trying this sport, you'll be welcomed. There is no dress code; all you need is your own paddle and sneakers. Play lasts about two hours. While, historically, there has been no fee for court use, this is changing as the ever-increasing demand has led some facilities like in Glenview to begin to charge a small fee to make a reservation.

Watch your MEL emails for a weekly invitation from Aaron; usually it is warm enough to play outside starting in April. We typically start the season at Stonegate Park in Northbrook.

MEL VISITS THE DOMES - By Gerry Linda



On Friday, March 8 fully 29 (!) Melmen-some with spouses and others without-visited the Domes at Mitchell Park in Milwaukee. We drove up in the rain, but that didn't matter because the domes are large (seven stories high), climate controlled eco-environments, unique flora conservatories (that only leaked a little bit). After our arrival, we were first given a private overview by our park-volunteer guide, who also provided advice about various not-to-miss features.



The first dome we entered was the Show Dome, which features five seasonal variations in its center along with permanent unusual tree and plant installations around the circular perimeter. The show this season was miniature towns constructed of different kids toys like Duplo and Lincoln Logs, among which ran three different H-gauge trains. The key flowers were vibrantly colored azaleas.



The next dome focused on desert plants from around the world. The space was spare, uniformly palehued, and not as warm as expected. Many of these samples were quite exotic and never-before-seen by most of our party. Examples five different included kinds of aloe, trees with

outlandishly-shaped branches and a ground-hugging cactus that resembled a nest of snakes.

The final dome was the Tropical Rain Forrest. Lush, damp, dense, quite green, noisy with flowing water. There was even a bridge over a pond with large koi swimming about.



Our May speaker will be new Melman, David Newman. He is a ham radio enthusiast and will share some of his experiences.


NEW MEL MEMBERS


