

FROM THE EDITOR




This month the feature article is about our trip to the Dunn Museum in Lake County, where we had a special presentation about the Crimes of Lake County and enjoyed seeing and learning about Bob Ross' landscape art. On October 17 over 30 Melmen travelled to the Dunn Museum in Libertyville. Dunn is a museum of the history of Lake County beginning with dinosaurs through the early 20th Century. In addition to their permanent collection, they create exhibits from their archives/ research and by hosting travelling exhibits prepared by others. This visit included both kinds of exhibitions as well as time to explore the permanent collection. (This was our second trip to Dunn; earlier we went to see an Ansel Adams exhibit.)

First, we had a private presentation by a museum staffer-True Crimes of Lake County. We learned about the first murder in the 1860s, the infamous Rondout Train Robbery (the largest train robbery in history; \$44 million in today's money; it was an inside job), the Dynamite Girl (an anarchist), various gang struggles during Prohibition between Al Capone and Bugs Moran (including incidents at the Mineola Hotel, the Fox Lake Beer Wars and the Fox Lake Massacre) and the Attempted Durand Kidnapping (of the grandchild

of a successful dairy owner, Grace Durand, known as The Dairy Queen; it was foiled by the police).

We then made our way to the large exhibition of Bob Ross paintings. You may remember the gentle, encouraging Ross with his curly hair and beard, from his PBS show, The Joy of Painting, during which he would create on camera an entire landscape painting in 30 minutes. The show ran for 11 years, and he is credited with an estimated 14,000 paintings! He specialized in what is termed the "wet on wet" technique in which different layers of color were applied over each other to achieve the desired effects. Interestingly, both Monet and Van Gogh used the same technique. This exhibit included dozens of his paintings as well as two videos showing him at work. Melmen noted that, in addition to employing brushes, part of his technique used the edge of a chisel-shaped knife to apply lots of the paint.

This was a MEL outing so we ended with lunch at Wildberry. Thanks are due Bruce Edelson for making all the arrangements.

The MEL Book Group has been around about seven years in its current iteration. We now meet on the fourth Thursday of each month, most regularly at the Deerfield Public Library. Our books can be either fiction or non-fiction, but the commonalities sought are that we want to learn something, and we also require something that will lead to an interesting discussion.

Our most recent books were The Ghost of Honolulu about what we knew or should have known before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, The Storied Life of A.J. Fikry, James, a fictionalized focus on Jim from Mark Twain's The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn, The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store and The Wager, based on the true story of the shipwreck of a British warship on the west coast of South America and the ultimate recovery of its crew. Two were non-fiction, three were fiction.

Sometimes the books are more controversial like the recently discussed Searching for Fatima, and many of our books have been turned into movies or series (although



none has measured up to the book). Notable among those have been Killers of the Flower Moon, Where the Crawdads Sing, Leave the World Behind, Lessons in Chemistry, Boys in the Boat and Gentleman in Moscow. Other books have ranged from Code Breaker by Walter Isaacson, a non-fiction telling of the Nobel Prize-winning developer of CRISPR, which has been used in the treatment of Covid-19 and is on the threshold of treating, maybe even eradicating, other illnesses, to Horse, The Warmth of Other Suns, and The Emperor of Pain.

Our next book is **The Tyranny of the Minority** by Steven Levitsky and Daniel Ziblatt. Bob Kohn will lead our discussion on Thursday, November 21 at 10:00 AM at the Deerfield Library. If you like thoughtful, interesting things to read such as the examples cited above, and if you like sharing your ideas with others, join us. Still not sure? Come for the discussion and see us in action.
