Twenty-three (23) Melmen and guests met for lunch on Friday, November 15 at Max & Benny's. So what, you say? Melmen are always meeting for lunch! In response to their question, MEL President, Bruce Edelson, told the officers how MEL was established and about the wonderful


programming we do. The officers then stayed for a few minutes to shmooze before collecting our gifts that will help make a happy holiday for many children.






MEL GOES TO WAR (OF THE WORLDS) - By Gerry Linda

On October 25 the MEL Movie Group celebrated a work of fiction first published in 1898, H.G.Wells' War of the Worlds. The basic story is that Martians looked at earthlings scurrying about our beautiful, desirable planet much like we might examine microbes in a drop of water. With their much greater technology, they looked at us with an intelligence that was "vast, cool and unsympathetic." They invade, kick our butts; it all seems hopeless, but then they all perish because they have not co-evolved for millions of years with the myriad of microscopic germs and viruses, etc. to which we had built immunity.





And Steven Spielberg, the modern Master of Film, made a version in 2005 that starred Tom Cruise, not playing his usual heroic role. It featured exceptional special effects and it, too, was quite unnerving.



Melmen listened to and saw all three versions and we had a rollicking discussion. Some had heard the radio program before, but many had not and were delighted. Several Melmen recalled seeing the 1953 movie and being terrified at the time. And about half of the attendees had not seen Spielberg's version and found it quite satisfying. He does not disappoint.

When I was a little kid, my parents were avid gin playerseach other with relatives friends. One friend, I remember. never sorted his cards because the acts of drawing, placing in his hand, and movie. and throwing cards might give a clue to his opponent. My dad played gin weekly with a bunch of buddies, so every

to play. Alfred Drake was a Broadway star and TV actor who loved to play gin and wrote this in 1949. The most famous gin player was Stu Unger, who was practically unbeatable in the 60s and 70s. Another gin star was the bridge and backgammon champion, Oswald Jacoby. Ernie Kovacs also played well and wrote a gin book. The best known fictional player was Auric Goldfinger, who famously cheated in the eponymous James Bond book

The game was invented in 1909 by Elwood

T. Baker and his son, C. Graham Baker. It remained local to New York until 1949 when it became a Hollywood fad and its popularity exploded. A survey by the US Card Playing Association found the number of people who learned to play gin during WWII was equal to the number who learned to play pinochle, cribbage, poker and bridge combined!

Depending on the time of the year, between 10 and 20 Melmen play at D'Agostino's on Milwaukee on the second Monday of the month. We play in teams with only the combined net score getting posted. We start at 11:00 AM, break for lunch (about \$20 including beverage and tip) and then continue until about 3:00 PM. Yeah, we play for money, but not for much. On a very bad day you might lose \$5.00. Why bother telling you all this? Because this is a typical fun, MEL, recurring activity. There's room for more/new players. At least two of our regulars were relatively new to the game when they started playing with us.



Did You Know The MEL Website Directory Has A SEARCH Function? (Go To menenjoyingleisure.org & save as a Favorite)

The MEL website directory has a search function that allows you to search for any characteristic of interest to you. For example:

- Find all the members that live in your suburb so you can find someone to carpool with for an activity.
- Or find all the members who were accountants so you can ask one of them about a tax question.

Here is how to use the MEL SEARCH function.

Step 1: On your mobile phone tap on the MENU bar which is the 3 white horizontal lines in the red bar on the right.



Step 2: Click on the red downward arrow next to the Members Area.

Note: The Members Area is password protected. If you are asked for a password type in melmen (all lower case).

Step 3: Click on the line titled Member Contact Information. This will expose the MEL Members Directory.

Now the fun begins!

Example 1: Find all the members that live in your suburb.

Type Skokie in the SEARCH bar located in the upper left-hand corner of the screen. All members living in Skokie will be displayed making it easy for you to find someone to carpool with if you live in Skokie!
